The area known as Tkaronto has been care taken by the Anishinabek Nation, the Haudenosaunee Confederacy, and the Huron-Wendat. It is now home to many First Nations, Inuit and Métis communities. We acknowledge the current treaty holders, the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. This territory is subject of the Dish with One Spoon Wampum Belt Covenant, an agreement to peaceably share and care for the Great Lakes region. Skennen'kó:wa Gamig

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Skennen'kó:wa Gamig (The House of Great Peace) is a renovated log cabin nestled in a wooded area on the Keele Campus. It is a dedicated gathering space for the York Indigenous community to gather, learn, support and share teachings. Gamig is equipped with a full kitchen, gathering space, a screened-in sunroom and a patio. Students may use Gamig for studying, hosting events and cultural reclamation. A Tipi is also located on the site.

The name Skennen'kó:wa Gamig comes from both the Mohawk and Anishinaabe languages. Skennen'kó:wa means "Great Peace," a cultural teaching that refers to the basis of the Haudenosaunee Confederacy. The Great Peace are the laws and responsibilities that Haudenosaunee people aspire to live by. Gamig is an Anishinaabemowin word that means "home" or "house." We see the house as a space where students, staff and faculty can "come home" to a peaceful environment on their journey through university life.

Indigeneity at York

Current Initiatives

The **Wüléelham programs** in the Faculty of Education are rooted in Indigenous knowledge and practices to promote learning from Indigenous peoples' experiences and perspectives. Wüléelham — translated from Lenâpé as “make good tracks” — offers Indigenous students opportunities to connect with Indigenous knowledge, history and culture.

The Indigenous Studies program in the Faculty of Liberal Arts & Professional Studies centres Indigenous community engagement inside and outside the classroom. Course offerings examine traditional knowledge and culture, treaties and the Indian Act, First Nations music, literature and cinema, Indigenous-Black relations and urban and Métis perspectives.

The Indigenous Council at York oversees the educational requirements and services that meet the needs of Indigenous learners on campus. The Council supports relationships between Indigenous communities and York University by advocating for Indigenous peoples to facilitate access to higher education.

Assistant Professor of Sociology Maya Chacaby recently developed a multiplayer online role-playing game, *Biskaabiiyaang: The Quest for the Language*, to support players in learning traditional stories and vocabulary. The game aims to protect Anishinaabemowin (the Ojibwe language) and support Indigenous students through their trauma.

Transfer and Mature Students

Whether you've been out of school for some time or are looking to transfer from another institution, York offers flexible learning options and pathways to help you continue your educational journey.

Transfer Students

Am I a Transfer Student?

A transfer student has completed prior post-secondary education at an accredited college or university, or is currently studying at one.

How Do I Transfer My Credits?

If you completed any courses at a post-secondary institution, we will assess you for transfer credit at the time of admission. You will receive a preliminary assessment of transfer credits on your offer of admission, if eligible.

How Are Transfer Credits Assessed?

Transfer credits are assessed based on:

- academic equivalency to York courses;
- the number of courses you have completed;
- grades achieved; and
- how your previous post-secondary studies fit with the program to which you've been admitted.

Depending on the program you are admitted to, you may be required to complete additional courses to meet program-specific requirements.

We will provide you with a transfer credit statement once you have accepted our offer of admission. It will list the number and type of York credits you are eligible to receive toward the program to which you have been admitted.

Mature Students

Are You a Mature Student?

The definition of a mature student can vary widely depending on self-identification, academic background and, of course, age. At York, we consider you to be a mature student if you:

- are at least 20 years old by the end of the calendar year when you are admitted to York;
- have been out of full-time, high-school studies for at least two years or have returned to upgrade after a two-year absence; or
- have completed less than one year of college- or university-level courses.

Rooted in Indigenous Thought, Waaban provides traditional and contemporary teachings from Indigenous Elders, educators and community leaders. Students will be introduced to cultural and community resources and have opportunities to learn from and with Indigenous educators. Waaban is in collaboration with the Toronto District School Board Indigenous Education Centre and will admit its next cohort of students to begin in Spring 2025.

Waaban Indigenous Teacher Education (BEd)

You will be introduced to cultural and community resources and have opportunities to learn from and with Indigenous educators. Graduates will be certified to teach in Ontario in one of the following teaching panels:

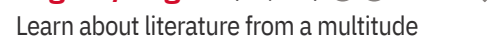

Global Health (BA, BSc)



The COVID-19 pandemic, climate change and growing rates of obesity and diabetes are examples of global health challenges that do not recognize borders. Our health and that of the rest of the world's population is intertwined with broader issues, including population growth and migration, wealth disparity, environmental degradation, corporate activity and government policy. Health not only involves the absence of disease, but also the promotion of physical, mental and social well-being – with keen attention to how the conditions that ensure health and health equity require positive health practices on both an individual and societal level. **Career paths include: healthcare manager, NGO leader, health data analyst, policy researcher, physician*, nurse* (*with further postgraduate training).**

Health Policy, Management & Digital Health (BHS)



Students in the Specialized Honours Bachelor of Health Studies (BHS) in Health Policy, Management & Digital Health are exposed to a wide-ranging suite of health policy, health management and digital health courses. Health Policy provides a strong interdisciplinary theoretical foundation drawing from political science, political economy, law, sociology, gender studies and ethics to critically assess social, cultural and health systems and contribute to policy research, development and implementation at all levels of society and within health systems. Health Management provides a systems approach to understanding

the organization and delivery of healthcare as well as how to approach problem solving and decision making to improve quality, safety, effectiveness, and equity in health systems. Digital Health provides a theory and application-based education in information management, digital health solutions, interoperable health information systems, and current debates in health informatics/digital health to support leading edge health systems. Students in the 4th-year Specialized Honours can get hands-on experience through a field placement in a variety of healthcare settings (HLST 4990 Health Studies Practicum). **Career paths include: health care manager, data analyst, digital health specialist, policy researcher / advisor.**

Health Studies (BHS)



Study health systems performance and leadership (Health Management), the importance of data and information analysis (Digital Health), or healthcare decision making (Health Policy). In addition to taking courses in management, digital health and policy, students study the breadth and depth of health and healthcare through a wide variety of issues and social contexts (such as social status and disability, homelessness), including case studies in healthcare in the community. Societal factors that determine why some people stay healthy and others become ill are also examined such as income, stress, early life, social exclusion, work conditions, unemployment, social support, mental health, addiction, food and transportation. Health Studies offers students the flexibility to attain a double major or do a minor in other Faculty of Health or York programs. The program also provides students with the flexibility to take additional prerequisites for postgraduate study in a professional program (e.g., medicine, law) or graduate school. **Career paths include: health policy researcher/advisor, health care manager (HR, finance, systems), health information specialist.**

Kinesiology & Health Science

(BA, BSc)

York's Kinesiology & Health Science program was ranked among the top ten programs in Ontario by the 2022 Shanghai Ranking's Global Ranking of Sport Science Schools and Departments. Understand physical

activity and its importance for human health, health science and society. Enjoy more course selections, taught by full-time faculty, than any other university in Canada. Research and experiential education opportunities are available in class, in labs and in the community. **Career paths include physician*, physiotherapist*, occupational therapist*, registered kinesiologist, recreation manager, health and fitness trainer** (*with further post-graduate training).

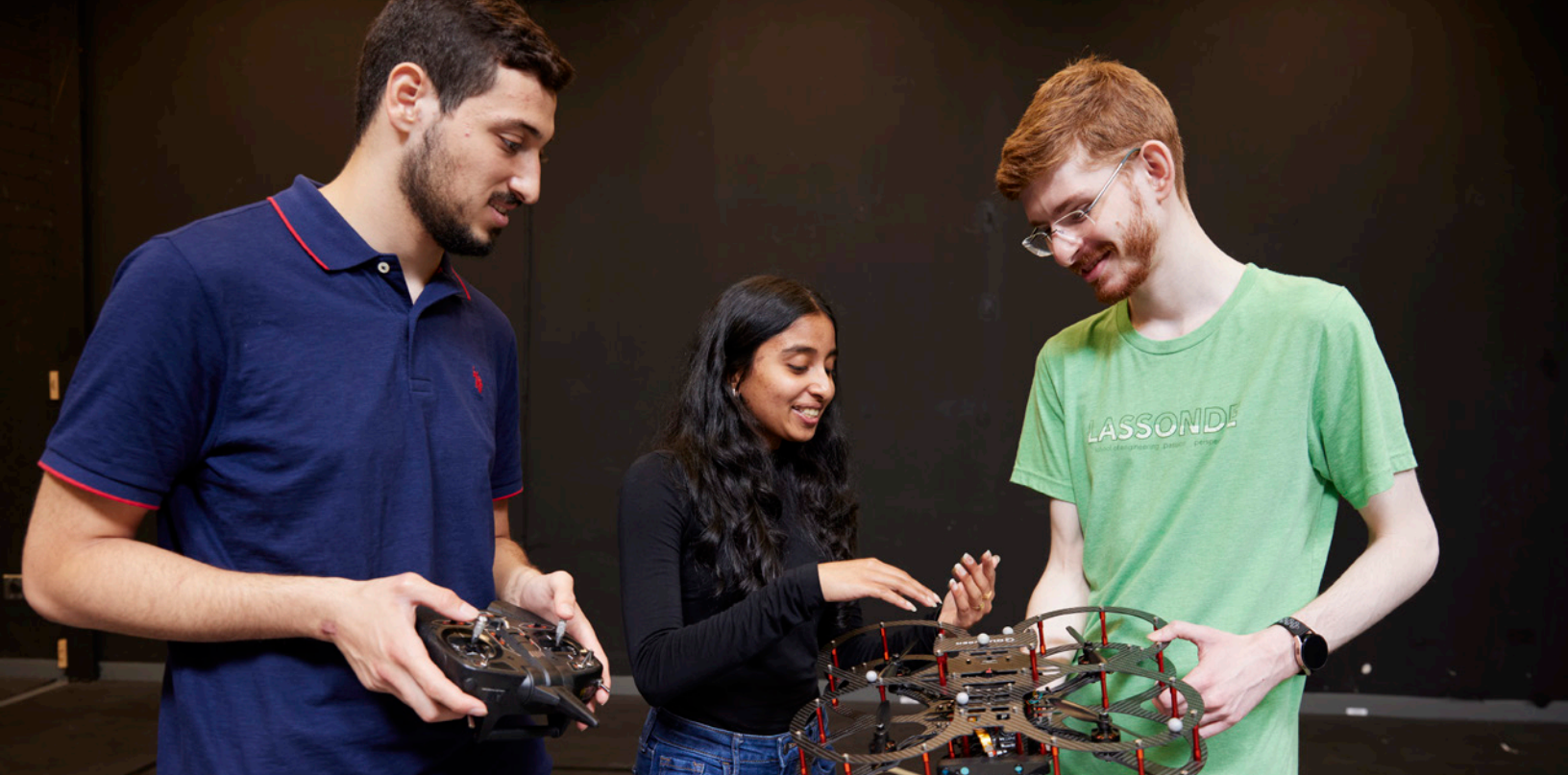
